Steel Fab Tour in Charlotte!



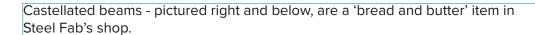
This year's gathering in Charlotte, NC for the NISD Annual meeting began with the fabrication shop tour of Steel Fab, Inc., about 18 miles from our hotel. We met at 1:30 p.m. at the Lobby of the Embassy Suites in Uptown Charlotte and loaded into the chartered bus for the trip to the shop.

At least, most of us did. Mr. Jim Truitt was on a call and did get left behind.

He had to take an Uber. We did wait for him to arrive before we entered the building prior to starting our tour!

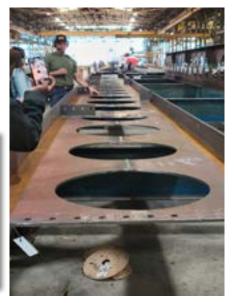
Established in 1955, Steel Fab, Inc. has grown to include 14 fabrication facilities and 15 offices, with the corporate office based in

Charlotte. Steel Fab, Inc., is an AISC Certified Steel Fabricator. The fabrication shop is about 400,000 square feet with 260 employees, processing about 12,000 labor hours and shipping 80 truckloads of fabricated steel per week. If you do the math on that, they are potentially producing <u>3.2 million pounds of steel PER WEEK at the</u> <u>Charlotte location alone!</u> That's a lot of steel.



The manufacuring process here involves cutting the beam web in the pattern shown in the bottom picture, then welding the beam 'center' pictured right.

This way, designers get both the beam stregth and depth needed to use as a steel joist substitute.



Below is a view of the complicated truss weld joint.









Steel Fab Tour - Charlotte, North Carolina



This is, hands down, the largest fabrication shop I have ever had the honor to see. Tour guides Brando Crouse and Henry Duncan were professionals at their job for sure. Each attendee was given eye protection and head phones prior to the start of the tour. The head phone sets each had a mic, enabling us to both hear our guide and to ask questions while on the tour.

There were 26 of us on the tour split into two groups. We were allowed to take pictures at will. We have included some of our favorites in this article. Many projects were underway, the largest of which were trusses for the Charlotte airport in various stages of fabrication. A huge portion of the shop was taken up with castellated beams in various stages of completion. It was explained to us that these castellated beams were currently a popular replacement for steel joist with long lead times.

Much of their work is moved by overhead crane, and just about every work bay had several cranes of varying capacity. You can see from the pictures how varied their project types are.

For many steel detailers, getting out of the office and being able to see the physical aspect of steel fabrication shop is a real treat. There is nothing quite like being able to see what was just lines on a page or a computer screen being transformed into something tangible.

We did make sure that Jim was on the bus before we left.

Thank you, Christine, for all your hard work with organizing this tour for all of our members. It is truly amazing to witness a well-oiled-machine such as Steel Fab, Inc., in action!

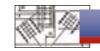

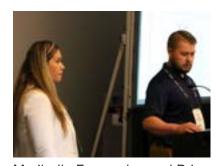

The first item we would like to bring to your attention is the proposed updates to the AISC-207 – The AISC Standard for Certification Programs, out for public review and comment from June 7 to July 7, 2023.

For those who are unaware, the AISC Standard for Certification Programs is the format by which the steel fabricators are directed to use to develop their Quality Control Manuals for becoming AISC Certified.



If you are not familiar with this document, as many steel detailers may not be, a free copy is available for download at: AISC 207 | American Institute of Steel Construction.

My focus was for the Section 1.7 - Detailing, as it is to this section that the steel fabricator will look for information on how to best manage their steel detailing.

While reviewing this document I noticed a stunning change. A much-needed adjustment had been made to one specific sentence taken from the current version of the AISC 207, section 1.7.6 – Detailing Functions, line 813, 814 which reads:

"A qualified checker shall check the fabrication and erection documents before release for fabrication."

This sentence now reads (with the changed part highlighted yellow):

"A qualified checker shall check the fabrication and erection documents prior to approval submittal"

These four words are a complete game changer, giving me renewed hope for our steel detailing future.

In my opinion, this change moves to be in compliance with the 'Detailing for Steel Construction' manual, Section 8 – Detailing Quality Control and Assurance, page 8-2, Approval of Drawings. Section 8 has specific directives for how, when and by whom the shop detail and erection drawings are to be checked. It is only correct that this directive be upheld in other AISC documents, for otherwise there is conflict.

Many seasoned and knowledgeable steel detailers, fabricators NISD Members and the AISC Committee members helped to write the 'Detailing for Steel Construction' manual, you can see their names in the forward. This manual, endorsed, promoted and printed by the AISC, contains the standard format used to educate steel detailers on the correct process, procedures and execution for detailing steel.

Changing the requirement for checking in the Section 1.7.6 - Detailing Functions which once read 'before release for fabrication' to 'prior to approval submittal', closes what has been a serious gap in the pathway to excellence for the steel fabricator and other industry partners. Most importantly, this correction supports the steel detailer with preventing the unquantifiable and catastrophic shop detail and erection drawing defects and scheduling delays caused by ringing up questions on approval submittal drawings.

When this change is adapted into the updated standard, achieving this goal for sending checked drawings prior to approval submittal requires:

- 1) Adequate and complete construction drawing review prior to detailing
- 2) Execution of expedient RFI Submittals and returns
- 3) Incorporation of correctly answered RFI data into the approval submittal drawings
- 4) An end to questions on approval submittal drawings

For steel fabricators to be compliant with the process for quality to have checked drawings at approval submittals, the steel detailer must produce fabrication ready drawings at approval, an activity which has always been the NISD Industry Standard.

There may be a learning curve for less sophisticated steel fabricator project managers who are unaware of what is required to adhere to this quality standard, but most of us are willing and capable to help them learn.

If not already doing so, steel detailers will want to present and discuss missing information and completed design require-

ments as the focus of initial pre-detailing kick off construction team meetings. Scheduling delays will be avoided when information gathering and execution is handled correctly. This activity for quality will eventually motivate design teams to align construction drawings to be in compliance with the AISC Code of Standard Practice requirements.

I am looking into the future here, but that is in my job description. The 'ripple effect' of good quality control will feed into the other trades. For good quality means less stress, eliminates confusion and supports the return of profitability, among other things, but I digress.

While not new to the updated version of the AISC 207, here is a commentary in that same section of the standard of which you should be aware:

'Commentary: Detailers and checkers should be assigned on the basis of qualification, evidenced by experience, training, and education. Qualification standards and certifications granted by recognized industry organizations, such as the National Institute of Steel Detailing, Inc. (NISD), can be used as a basis for qualification.'

I had heard in the old days that the AISC generally did not care nor support steel detailers. This news both surprised and frustrated me personally, as I could not comprehend the sense of it as the construction trades are so intertwined.

What we have found in recent years is that sentiment has changed. That the AISC supports the detailing trade was proved by their actions in 2019 when AISC representatives Scott Melnick, AISC Vice President and Larry Kruth, then President of Engineering, attended our 51st annual meeting in St. Louis, on a mission to invite us to present the NASCC Detailing Tracks sessions annually. I remain excited and appreciative to help organize and support these sessions.

As my dear friend and colleague David Merrifield would say — "The rising tide lifts all boats". The more we learn, share and help each other be the best we can be, the more we all benefit from that effort!

Not to be overshadowed by the news of this AISC grand gesture, the second item of hope to which we wanted to direct your attention is regarding an article in the Summer Edition 2023 edition of the Steel Erector's Association of America's publication 'The Connector'.

It is an article written by Tim Heston, senior editor of The Fabricator Magazine, originally titled 'Best Communication Practices in Structural Steel Fabrication', and now titled 'Asking the Right Detailing Questions – Why Communication Problems in Construction Increase the Price Tag'. Connector - Summer 2023 by The SEAA Connector - Issuu – hopefully this link works for you as it is a great read and very informative. This article supports the need for inclusion of the steel erector's view and input in the pre-detailing meeting we should be having at the beginning of our projects.

Best practice for sequencing, connections, columns splicing, safety, weld symbols and minimizing field work mentioned in this article are all considerations for which the steel detailer needs to be aware. For those who have a copy of the 'Detailing Guide for Steel Erector's Safety and Efficiency', Volume III, 2019, you will recognize much of the information this article provides.

Steel detailing has grown from being considered a trade consequence or inconvenience to what is now thought of as a highly valued entity. Our clients and partners have come to realize that the right choice for steel detailers is vital to project success. Steel detailers have always known this, but now it is a common conversation amongst our peers. Thought impossible by many, this type of positive recognition has now become a reality.

My friends, we have arrived.

The NISD is truly grateful for the continued support of all our trade partners, and especially now to the American Institute of Steel Construction and the Steel Erectors Association of America for all that they do!

In closing, I continue to be proud to be an NISD member, am very honored to serve, and remain encouraged about our future! My hope is that you too, are hopeful and positive about the possibilities which lie ahead!
